We celebrate the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Marriage

In the Gospel Reading Christ has a stern thing to say about all marriage: if a husband divorces his wife and marries again, he commits adultery, and so does his wife if she remarries.

Given that stern saying, why would anyone want to marry? Why would God *want* anyone to marry?

The First Reading describes the way God arranged the first marriage. When Adam is without Eve, God says that it isn't good for Adam to be alone—and *that's* the reason for God's creating Eve and arranging Adam's marriage to her.

When God made human beings embodied and gendered, he gave them the great gift.

But who made the man in such a way that it isn't good for him to be alone? God did, didn't he? God didn't make the angels this way. Angels don't get married. They don't have children either. No angel is in himself the union of two other angels, who merged something of themselves to form him. As far as that goes, angels have no gender either. An angel isn't male or female. No angel can say to another angel, "You complete me." It is perfectly fine for an angel to be alone.

Human beings have what angels lack: the glorious richness of embodied, gendered human life. But there is a fragility about this rich embodied life too. Those who do get married are open to each other and dependent on each other, and so they become terribly vulnerable to each other, too.

And here it is worth noticing that both the Readings focus on men. In the First Reading, God's arrangements for Adam have the result Adam sketches: a *man* will leave his parents and cling to his wife. In the Gospel Reading, Christ is responding to the Pharisees' question whether it is lawful for a *husband* to divorce his wife. Most of the time, in the post-Fall world, the risks of marriage are unequally distributed between the genders. They tend to fall more on women than on men.

When God made human beings embodied and gendered, he gave them the great gift, lacking for the angels, that they could be joined together for life in marriage, with children. For us, who live in the post-Fall world Adam bequeathed us, this gift comes with beset with risks for heart-breaking suffering. The challenge for us is to preserve the promise and beauty of God's gift. The perils of marriage for women—and also for men—is hedged in by Christ's stern prohibition against divorce.

POPE FRANCIS COLUMN



Santa Marta: Feast of the Guardian Angels: October 2nd

'Do You Speak With Your Angel?'

Pope Francis wants to know if you are talking with your guardian angel. And he left no doubt on October 2, 2018, that such conversations are important.

His comments came during his homily at Mass at Casa Santa Marta in the Vatican, on the Feast of the Guardian Angels.

On the path of life, the Christian is helped by “companions, protectors”, a “compass that looks like the human and that helps us look where we need to go,” the Pope said in his homily reported by Vatican News.

The Holy Father mentioned three dangers our Guardian Angel can help us to avoid:

A danger of just settling down and not moving forward, fearing to take risks.

A danger of taking the wrong path.

A danger of getting off the path, lost and confused.

The first danger – of inaction – appears especially dangerous.

“There is the danger of not going on the journey. And how many people settle down, and don’t set out on the journey, and their whole life is stalled, without moving, without doing anything... It is a danger,” Francis explained. “Like that man in the Gospel who was afraid to invest the talent. He buried it and said ‘I am at peace, I am calm. I can’t make a mistake. So I won’t take a risk.’

“And so many people don’t know how to make the journey, or are afraid of taking risks, and they are stalled. But we know that the rule is that those who are stalled in life end up corrupted. Like water: when the water is stopped up in a place, the mosquitos come, they lay their eggs, and everything is corrupted. Everything. The angels help us, they push us to continue on the journey.”

And what of the dangers of taking the wrong path or getting lost? Here, Pope Francis shows how they can guide us:

“And the Lord says, ‘Have respect for their presence.’ The angel is authoritative; he has authority to guide us. Listen to him. ‘Hearken to his voice, and do not rebel against him.’ Listen to the inspirations, which are always from the Holy Spirit – but the angel inspires them.

“But I want to ask you a question: Do you speak with your angel? Do you know the name of your angel? Do you listen to your angel? Do you allow yourself to be led by hand along the path, or do you need to be pushed to move?”

The Holy Father emphasized that our Guardian Angels not only help us to stay on the right path but show us our destination:

“Our angel is not only with us; he also sees God the Father. He is in relationship with Him. He is the daily bridge, from the moment we arise to the moment we go to bed. He accompanies us and is a link between us and God the Father. The angel is the daily gateway to transcendence, to the encounter with the Father: that is, the angel helps me to go forward because he looks upon the Father, and he knows the way. Let us not forget these companions along the journey.”

As we know over the last 12 months the Royal Commission has been hearing evidence and has given a final report.

The Church has responded and will contribute to the National redress scheme.

Over the next weeks there will be aspects of the Church's response and for you to reflect upon.

The only point the church will not agree to is the question of Religious regarding the seal of confession.

- Through their work and witness, we have learnt about the changes we need to make-culturally and operationally-to be a safer place for children

Legion of Mary

Frank Duff was a member of the St Vincent de Paul but then he realised that there was more spiritual poverty than material poverty and so he started the Legion and went around to encourage people to practise their faith and God must have been pleased with what Frank did because if it wasn't for God's blessing, the Legion would not have survived all this time.

Most of our work is visiting people within the parish, mainly sick or elderly. One day Jesus will be asking us if we visited him when he was sick or in hospital on that day we would wish that we have visited him a 1000 times, we still got the time, this is another opportunity to keep the boss happy!

There are many more things we can do, depending on one's talents, many times we stay back because nobody encourages us, we need to be encouraged and that's why we need to join a group like the Legion of Mary to support one another and have some fun as we go.

Normally we meet every Thursday after the mass, and the meeting would be finished within the hour. We spend some time in prayer, we read, we discuss a few things and we finish with a prayer, it is always a happy time, once you start coming you will be looking forward for another meeting. If the day does not suit you we can negotiate that too. But, don't say you have no time, we all have the same time just a matter of how we spend our time and our time is a gift from God. One day we have to give an account on how we spent our time.

**Parish Safeguarding Support Officer
Volunteer Required**

We want you, we want you, we want you as a New Recruit! No, not for the Navy, but for the Parish!!

The Safeguarding Office of the Archdiocese of Sydney has recently launched an initiative to recruit Parish Safeguarding Support Officers (PSSO) to support the Parish Priest to implement proactive Safeguarding measures to ensure safe environments for children, young people and the vulnerable in Parish communities. The PSSO may already be an employee or volunteer in the Parish but the role is on a volunteer basis only.

The ways in which the PSSO could support and assist the Parish Priest:

- Providing Safeguarding induction to all workers and training to volunteers of the Parish who work with children, including reading and signing of the *Code of Conduct for Working With Children and Young People*
- Raising awareness of Safeguarding in your Parish
- Creating Risk Assessments for Parish events/activities
- Responding to Safeguarding audit and compliance requirements
- Reporting any issues or concerns that come to your attention according to Archdiocesan protocols
- Monitoring the Visiting Clergy Register in line with current protocols
- Any other Safeguarding issues as requested by the Parish Priest

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY SUNDAY

October 7 is dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary and the Church also dedicated the month of October to pray the Rosary. The Rosary is a prayer that came from Heaven when Our Lady appeared to St Dominic and to St Catherine of Sienna and when later appeared to the children in Fatima and told them to pray the Rosary. The Prayers that we say are also composed by God. Jesus gave us the Our Father and the Hail Mary as a message from God, delivered by the Archangel Gabriel to Mary. The Gloria is a hymn we find in the Bible which the angels sing to God in Heaven. It might be repetitive but then what can we say to God that He does not know?

It might be that repeating these beautiful prayers is a way to spend time in God's company, it takes 15 minutes roughly to say the Rosary, there is 100, 15 minutes lots in one day, so spending 15 minutes in the day to Him who is giving us all the time, is only 1% of the day! Palms Australia

Palms Australia began work in Catholic parishes in Sydney as the Paulian Association in 1956. In 1961 the PALMS program started preparing Catholics for global mission. In 2001 the organisational name became Palms Australia to reflect the mission that had spread far beyond Sydney. This rich experience has now been brought under a new insignia (above).

The new logo at Palms Australia reflects giving and receiving in mutual support. Its balance provides a simple reminder to share our love of justice and with humility offer opportunity to and find solidarity with the poor. It is a reminder to connect with the chosen ones of Jesus.

The vision of Palms Australia challenges us to bridge difference and nurture togetherness in our world; to realise that *under Christ Jesus there is no longer Jew and Greek, Slave and Free, Male and Female* (Gal. 3:28). We are asked to reach beyond our differences and affirm the dignity of all.

Palms Australia carefully prepares teachers, health professionals, accountants, managers, and others who volunteer for Palms mission work so that they may share their skills to assist overseas parishes and vital grass root movements aiming to foster sustainable solutions to poverty.

I encourage you to please share the work of Palms by bulletin notices and fliers and thereby encourage people to be involved.

The Church supports those who take up a global mission placement in these practical ways:

1. The Archdiocese will cover the preparation cost of up to five volunteers per annum at Palms' Orientation course and a re-entry weekend on their return.
2. Catholic Bishops support a Lay Missionary Gratuity Fund that in 2019 will provide a payment of \$2,500 for each year a person is on mission.
3. Catholic schools may offer opportunity and support to teachers giving up to two years for a mission placement. Teachers should talk with Palms about details.
