Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Life After Death

In the First Reading, Isaiah dates a religious vision not by a day but by a
death: " ... in the year that King Uzziah died."

There are some things so painful for a person that events in his life can be
dated by them: "in the year my wife died"; "in the year we lost our mom"; "in
the year the hurricane devastated the town." An affliction of this sort
divides a whole life into *before* and *after*: there is the life you had before
your wife died, and then there is the life you have afterwards, after the
death of your wife and the death of everything that made up your life
together. If you can stand under your sorrow rather than falling apart, then
through the searing grief can come a new life.

Sometimes in unbearable grief such as that stemming from the death of
someone so loved, a person doesn't know how to stand under his sorrow.
A heartbroken person has lost something central to him; and a person can
fall apart when the centre doesn't hold.

In those circumstances, a grieved and suffering person can want to die
then too; he can want to come to the Lord too. When King Uzziah died,
Isaiah came before the Lord, but only in a vision, where the doorposts
shook and the house filled up with smoke.

The problem is that you can't really come to the Lord before *your* time on
earth is over, and falling apart under grief gets you only an increase of
sorrow. Isaiah responded to that vision of the Lord by saying "Woe is me! I
am doomed!"

This is not the end of the story for Isaiah, though. An angel seared Isaiah's
mouth with a burning coal! And then Isaiah opened his mouth and offered
to serve the Lord. When God asked, "whom shall I send?" Isaiah said,
"here I am. Send me." All his most important service for the Lord came
after the death that dates his vision and that changed his life.

When Isaiah himself finally died and came to the Lord, three kings later, he
had become the foremost prophet of Israel. Because in the end he didn't
fall apart but lived *after* King Uzziah's death, he produced the great
prophecies of the Messiah that even now give the whole world hope.
If you can stand under your sorrow rather than falling apart, then through
the searing grief can come a new life, a good life that was unimaginable to
you *before*. If you can stand and live into the period of your life *after* the
destruction of your heart's desire, then God's grace can bring life out of
death for you.

Abu Dhabi: Historic Document Signed by Pope Francis and Grand Imam of Al-Azhar

'Human Fraternity for World Peace and Living Together'

February 04, 2019 air Ecumenism and Interreligious dialogue, Papal Trips

Pope Francis and the Grand Imam of Al-Azhar on February 4, 2019, signed the Document on "Human Fraternity for World Peace and Living Together." The signing following the Holy Father's speech to the Global Conference on Human Fraternity in Abu Dhabi, a key element in the Holy Father's February 3-5 apostolic visit to the United Arab Emirates.

"The document represents an important step forward in the dialogue between Christians and Muslims and is a powerful sign of peace and hope for the future of humanity," said a statement from Alessandro Gisotti, Interim Director of the Vatican's Press Office.

Earlier today, Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Pietro Parolin told journalists, including Zenit's Deborah Lubov, that the importance of this day is dialogue among religions, especially Christianity and Islam, promoting peace and combatting fundamentalism.

The press office statement continued:

"The Document is a vibrant appeal to respond with good to evil, to reinforce interreligious dialogue and to promote mutual respect in order to block the road to those who add fuel to the fire of the clashes between civilizations. At Abu Dhabi, Francis and Al-Tayyib have together indicated a way of peace and reconciliation on which not only Christians and Muslims can walk, but all people of good will.

"The Document is courageous and prophetic because it confronts, and calls by name, the most urgent issues of our day on which those who believe in God are encouraged to question their own conscience and to confidently assume their own responsibility so as to give life to a more just and united world.

"With unambiguous words, the Pope and the Grand Imam declare that no one is ever authorized to exploit God's name to justify war, terrorism or any other form of violence. In addition, they affirm that life must always be safeguarded and, at the same time, that the rights of women are to be fully recognized, and every discriminatory practice in their regard rejected.

"Before humanity, wounded by so many divisions and ideological fanaticism, the Pontiff and the Grand Imam Al-Azhar demonstrate that promoting a culture of encounter is not a utopia, but is the necessary condition for living in peace and leaving for future generations a better world than the one in which we live."

The theme of the February visit is "Make Me a Channel of Your Peace" – and that's the Pope's intention in going to the United Arab Emirates, according to Greg Burke, director of the Vatican Press Office.

Although the UAE is a majority-Muslim country, about 10 percent of the population is Catholic, many of those faithful being foreign workers from Catholic nations such as the Philippines.

Crown Prince Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al-Nahyan greeted the Pope as he stepped off the plane and onto Emirati soil.

As they entered the airport, children in traditional garb presented the Holy Father with a bouquet of flowers and welcomed him to the UAE in his native Spanish.

Pope Francis then greeted his old friend and ally in his quest to strengthen dialogue between East and West, the Grand Imam of al-Azhar, Ahmed el-Tayeb.

Parish Safeguarding Support Officer Volunteer Required

We want you, we want you, we want you as a New Recruit! No, not for the Navy, but for the Parish!!

The Safeguarding Office of the Archdiocese of Sydney has recently launched an initiative to recruit Parish Safeguarding Support Officers (PSSO) to support the Parish Priest to implement proactive Safeguarding measures to ensure safe environments for children, young people and the vulnerable in Parish communities. The PSSO may already be an employee or volunteer in the Parish but the role is on a volunteer basis only.

The ways in which the PSSO could support and assist the Parish Priest:

- Providing Safeguarding induction to all workers and training to volunteers of the Parish who work with children, including reading and signing of the *Code of Conduct for Working With Children and Young People*
- Raising awareness of Safeguarding in your Parish
- Creating Risk Assessments for Parish events/ activities
- Responding to Safeguarding audit and compliance requirements
- Reporting any issues or concerns that come to your attention according to Archdiocesan protocols
- Monitoring the Visiting Clergy Register in line with current protocols
- Any other Safeguarding issues as requested by the Parish Priest
