Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Who Cares?

Everything is vanity, the reading from Ecclesiastes says. The writer of Ecclesiastes means that everything is in vain. You toil in the day; you're anxious in the night. And it's all for nothing, the writer thinks. Who cares about it?

No wonder many people think Ecclesiastes is a depressing book! Work done for love of the Lord lasts.

But notice that Jesus says something similar in the Gospel reading. The rich man was thinking about building bigger barns. But in the parable God says to him, "You fool! This night your soul will be required of you, and somebody else will get all your stuff." How will the rich man care about his barns then?

And that's the problem with many of the things we care about in this life, barns or material goods of any kind: you lose them when you die.

The same thing is true of a lot of what we spend our lives on. Those things don't amount to anything in the long run; and, like the rich man, we waste the part of our lives that we use up on them. There is time spent struggling for the next honor or the next accomplishment. There is time consumed on sorrowing over not having gotten the next honor or accomplishment. For that matter, there is time frittered away watching TV or surfing the internet, or just puttering around doing nothing. Picture yourself as you come before God at your death, returning to God the talents he entrusted to you. Will you care about any of those things then?

That's why Ecclesiastes says they are vanity. Whatever good is in them is transient; they die when you do.

In the long run, then, who cares about them? You can't take any of them with you when you die, any more than the rich man could take his barns with him. When you come before the face of God you won't care about them then either.

Ecclesiastes is a consoling book, not a depressing one. The transience of earthly goods should be comforting to us. Barns may be good, but, in the long run, getting them—or losing them—is not of overwhelming importance. We can do our work in quiet, and we can suffer our reverses in

quiet too, because none of these things last.

Love lasts. Work done for love of the Lord lasts. And guess what—the Lord himself is ever-lasting. If what you want is God, what you want will last.

What is worth caring about is what lasts.

Church and World Leaders Unite in Call for End to Human Trafficking

'I came that they may have life and have it abundantly' JULY 30, 2019 HUMAN RIGHTS AND JUSTICE When Pope Francis spoke April 11, 2019, to participants of the International Conference on Human Trafficking: 'A wound on the body of contemporary humanity', organized by the Migrants and Refugees Section of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, he turned to the Gospel of John for the words to put the scourge of human trafficking into perspective:

"I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (Jn 10: 10).

"This phrase of the Gospel of John summarizes Jesus' mission: to offer life in fullness to all men and women of every age, according to the plan of the Father.," the Holy Father said. "The Son of God made Himself man to show to all human beings the way of fulfillment of their humanity, in conformity with the uniqueness and unrepeatability of each one.

"Unfortunately, the world at present is sadly marked by situations that hinder the fulfillment of this mission. As highlighted in the Pastoral Orientations on Human Trafficking, 'our times have witnessed a growth of individualism and egocentricity, attitudes that tend to regard others through a lens of cool utility, valuing them according to criteria of convenience and personal benefit'."

Today, July 30, 2019, the Pope's ongoing appeal for an end to human trafficking is joined by Church and secular leaders around the world, including the Holy Father's native Argentina.

"We ask the God of life for the courage and decision to listen to the cry for help of so many sisters and brothers deprived of their dignity and their freedom, and to accompany them, defend them, looking for paths to a quick and lasting solution to this crime." This is the appeal launched by the Bishops' Commission for the pastoral care of migrants and itinerants (CEMI) of the Argentine Bishops' Conference on the occasion of the World Day against Trafficking.

"The protection of minors is an integral part of the Gospel message hence there is need to create a safe environment for them, giving priority to their interests", said the Archbishop of Blantayre, Malawi, Msg. Thomas Luke Msusa, addressing the African Bishops during the meeting, which has recently concluded, with SECAM (Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar).

Msusa, who is the Vice-Chairman of Association of Member Episcopal Conferences in Eastern Africa (AMECEA), has exhorted African bishops to root out for causes of child trafficking, child labor and children soldier to ensure that children are well protected in all aspects.

Trafficking is a problem for children as well as adults, a point made especially clear in a just-released report. And the problem is growing.

A quarter of suspected or identified trafficking victims in Europe are children and the main goal of human traffickers is sexual exploitation — a new report released by Save the Children finds. Out of 20,500 victims who were registered in the European Union in 2015-16, 56 percent of cases were related to trafficking for sexual exploitation, while 26 percent of cases were related to labour exploitation. One in four victims is under 18 and two out of three victims are women or girls.

On this World Day against Trafficking in Persons, let us reaffirm our commitment to stop criminals from ruthlessly exploiting people for profit and to help victims rebuild their lives," urged UN Secretary-General António Guterres.

CATHOLIC ARCHBISHOP CONDEMNS NSW ABORTION LEGISLATION

The Catholic Archbishop of Sydney, Most Rev Anthony Fisher OP has condemned a new bill to be debated this week in the NSW Parliament which would decriminalise abortion in the state.

Under the proposed law, abortion would be legalised on request for women up to 22 weeks pregnant if the procedure is performed by a registered doctor. In instances beyond 22 weeks' gestation, abortion can be legally conducted with the consent of two doctors.

Archbishop Fisher said the new legislation is an attack on the sanctity of life and must be strongly opposed.

"New attempts to make abortion even more widely available in NSW are deeply troubling," Archbishop Fisher said. "The measure of a society is how it protects its most vulnerable, be they unborn children, their mothers who are too often pressured emotionally, financially and even physically to choose against the life of their child, or the sick and frail elderly.

"Rather than pursuing laws that will lead to more abortions, we should instead be investing in ways to support pregnant women who feel they have no other choice.

"I urge all Catholics to rally against this proposed law and, at the same time, recommit ourselves to reaching out with prayer and practical support for women in crisis."

Archbishop Fisher is encouraging all Catholics to immediately contact their local state MP given the bill is to be tabled this week, urging them to vote against it.

"We must tell our elected MPs that if they are serious about wanting to protect human life they must reject this bill," he said.


