Dear Parishioners,

We celebrate the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Ask, Ask, Ask, Ask, Ask

In the Gospel Reading, Jesus teaches his disciples how to pray; and when he does, he gives not only them but all of us the wonderful prayer we call 'the Our Father' or 'the Lord's prayer.'

The first thing to notice about the Lord's prayer is that it is full of petitions. The first one is that God's name would be hallowed. The second is that God's kingdom would come. The third is that God would give us our daily bread. And so on.

The Lord's prayer isn't just a litany of praise to God, then. It isn't just an expression of a pious wish that God's will be done. It isn't only a surrender of one's own will to God. Just look at the request for daily bread. It presents to God what we would want God to give us. Having desires and presenting them to God are required by the Lord's prayer.

The Lord's prayer requires us to trust God enough to tell him what we want—over and over and over.

The second thing to notice about the Lord's prayer is that people don't generally get what they ask for. Ask and you will receive, the Lord says. But how many people around the world pray the Lord's prayer and go without food that day? And food is only the beginning. In every mass, we ask God for healing: "Only say the word and my soul shall be healed." Then we lug our sinful, sick, and sorrowful souls around another day. So here is the third thing to notice. Jesus doesn't promise that we will get the very thing we ask for. He says that if we ask, we will receive; but he doesn't happen to mention what we will receive.

If you think about it, you can see the point. If a sick person could heal himself, he would be the doctor, not the patient. The patient's job is to want to get well. It is the doctor's job to figure out how to get him well. In the same way, the Lord's prayer requires us to trust God enough to tell him what we want—over and over and over. Our job is to ask continually. God's job is to figure out what to give us that will really fill us and heal us. So we might not get what we ask for. But as long as we keep asking, the Lord promises that we will receive—grace, pressed down, shaken together, running over, and gently given, from the God who loves us.

2. Charitable Works Fund (CWF)

POPE FRANCIS COLUMN



Pope's Angelus Address: On Jesus' Visit to the Home of Martha and Mary

'Today's Gospel Reminds Us that Wisdom of Heart Lies Precisely in Being Able to Combine These Two Elements: Contemplation and Action.' JULY 21, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters, good morning!

In this Sunday's passage, the evangelist Luke narrates Jesus' visit to the home of Martha and Mary, Lazarus' sisters (Cf. Luke 10:38-42). They receive Him and Mary sits at His feet to listen to him. She leaves what she was doing to be close to Jesus; she doesn't want to miss any of His words. Everything is put aside when He comes to visit us in our life; His presence and word come before anything else. The Lord always surprises us: when we truly listen to Him, the clouds vanish, doubts cede the place to truth, fears to serenity, and the different situations of life find their right place. When the Lord comes, He always arranges things, also us.

In this scene of Mary of Bethany at Jesus' feet, Saint Luke shows the praying attitude of the believer, who is able to be in the Master's presence to listen to Him and to be in tune with Him. It's about pausing during the day, recollecting oneself in silence for a few minutes, to make room for the Lord who "passes" and to find the courage to stay somewhat "aside" with Him, to then return with more serenity and efficacy to the everyday things. Praising Mary's behaviour, who "chose the better part" (v. 42) Jesus seems to repeat to each one of us: "Don't let yourself be overwhelmed by the things you have to do, but listen first of all to the Lord's voice, to do well the tasks that life assigns to you."

Then there is the other sister, Martha. Saint Luke says that it was she who received Jesus (Cf. v. 38). Perhaps Martha was the older of the two sisters, we don't know, but this woman certainly had the charism of hospitality. In fact, while Mary was listening to Jesus, <Martha> was wholly taken up with many services. Therefore, Jesus says to her: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things" (v. 41). With these words, He certainly doesn't intend to condemn the attitude of service but rather the breathlessness with which it is sometimes lived. We also share Saint Martha's concerns and, on her example, we try to have the sense of hospitality, of fraternity lived in our families and in our communities, so that each one can feel "at home," especially the little ones and the poor when they knock on the door. Therefore, today's Gospel reminds us that wisdom of heart lies precisely in being able to combine these two elements: contemplation and action. Martha and Mary show us the way. If we wish to relish life with joy, we must associate these two attitudes: on one hand, "to be at the feet" of Jesus, to listen to Him while the secret of every thing is revealed to us; on the other, to be solicitous and prompt in hospitality, when He passes and knocks on our door, with the face of a friend who is in need of a moment of respite and fraternity. This hospitality is needed.

May Mary Most Holy, Mother of the Church, give us the grace to love and serve God and our brothers with Martha's hands and Mary's heart because, remaining always listening to Christ, we can be architects of peace and hope.

Detention policy 'beyond a disgrace'

"As a bishop and a former boat person, I deplore the detention of our brothers and sisters on Nauru and Manus Island," writes Parramatta Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv. Source: Catholic Outlook.

This weekend marked the sixth anniversary of former Prime Minister Kevin Rudd's announcement that no person seeking asylum by boat would ever be resettled in Australia.

Every single person arriving after that date was to be subjected to indefinite detention on Manus Island, PNG, or in the Republic of Nauru, under "processing" arrangements between the Australian Government and those Pacific states.

Six years on, roughly 800 refugees and people seeking asylum remain trapped on Manus Island and Nauru.

International agencies have been appalled by the conditions under which they live and the effects on their health, spirits and self-respect. Pope Francis, with whom the bishops of Australia discussed the refugee crisis at their recent Ad Limina visit in Rome, is also deeply concerned. The human costs on the detainees are mounting by the day. Already 12 young men have died over these past six years and many more have attempted self-harm out of utter despair.

As a bishop and a former boat person, I deplore the detention of our brothers and sisters on Nauru and Manus Island. While recognising the effort of the government to find a durable solution, I say with many fellow Australians that enough is enough. The harsh treatment of this relatively small number of people — most of whom have been proven genuine refugees — over the past six years is more than a shame, a disgrace, or something that we can say "not in our name" to

We call on our government and political leaders to act in accordance with our honourable tradition and put an end to a deplorable situation. It is time to find an alternate and conscionable solution. It is time to bring them here or to New Zealand, which has offered a helping hand. Those refugees accepted for entry to the US could then migrate when their vetting processes are complete. The other refugees should then be able get on with their lives here in safety. Those who are not refugees can be held here in secure detention until they are returned home.

New guidelines for Church's response to the Sexual Abuse

The national guidelines will be a focal point for the Church's work in keeping children and vulnerable adults safe.

The Church is developing new national policy guidelines to strengthen and standardise Church authorities' responses to historical and contemporary concerns and allegations of abuse of children and vulnerable adults. Source: ACBC Media Blog.

Archbishop Mark Coleridge, president of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, said the development of the guidelines is a critical step forward in the Church's ongoing response to the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

"The bishops are following through on our commitments made last year, and having a consistent approach to the management of allegations of abuse of children and vulnerable people is central to our reforms," he explained.

The Implementation Advisory Group, set up in May 2018 to monitor and advise Catholic leaders on the Church's response to the Royal Commission's recommendations, is overseeing the development of the policy guidelines.

The guidelines will serve as a public commitment to integrity and accountability in responding to allegations of abuse. They will make clear the obligations of all Church authorities to respond with processes that are fair and effective, and which comply with all Australian laws.

The assessment and management of risk to children will remain paramount throughout the new national guidelines. Prioritising children's safety and wellbeing will ensure that Church authorities' responses to concerns or allegations effectively address existing risks and do not create further risk to children.

The guidelines will be considered in conjunction with the new National Catholic Safeguarding Standards, approved and launched by Catholic Professional Standards Ltd earlier this year.

"The national guidelines and the Safeguarding Standards will become two focal points for the Church's work in protecting children and vulnerable adults from abuse and ensuring survivors are at the centre of our response to allegations that arise," Archbishop Coleridge said.

The guidelines will address all forms of child abuse, including sexual, physical and psychological abuse, and neglect and maltreatment. The development of the guidelines will include extensive consultation, inviting abuse survivors and their supporters to participate.

"The lessons we have learned over more than 20 years and the best practice employed in other parts of the community will inform the new national guidelines," Archbishop Coleridge said.
