Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the 15th Sunday of the Year

1. What Must I Do?

In the Gospel Reading, a lawyer asks Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus says to the lawyer, Well, how do YOU read the law? Without hesitation, the lawyer gives Jesus the answer, which he, the lawyer, already knew: Love God wholly and your neighbor as yourself.

Right! Jesus tells him. You do that, and you'll live. But wait, the lawyer says, who is my neighbor?

Giving everything in love for God is a holiness we can find only through Christ's unstinting outpouring of love for us.

And then Jesus tells the lawyer the parable of the bad priest and the bad Levite and the good Samaritan. Then Jesus finishes with another question to the lawyer: which of these was the neighbor of the robbery victim?

The lawyer gives the answer he has to give: the good neighbor was the Samaritan.

The more you think about this story, the more peculiar it seems.

For example, notice the oddness of the lawyer's first question. He doesn't ask: what is best way to soar in love of God? He asks: what must I do to inherit eternal life? He is looking for the minimum necessary to get into heaven, isn't he? But eternal life is a union, a marriage, with God. Who would want to get married to someone who said, "what's the minimum I can do for you and with you and still get you to marry me?"

So Jesus gets the lawyer himself to answer his question, and the lawyer gives the right answer. What you have to do, the minimum necessary, is everything. Love God wholly, and love your neighbor as yourself.

This is a disconcerting answer, of course, because in this life none of us is ever going to do everything. So if everything is the minimum necessary, then none of us is getting in.

And so the lawyer expresses his original anxiety with a variation on his odd question. Who is my neighbor, he asks? He wants a definition of neighbor which gives him the minimum number of people to count as the neighbors he has to love.

But Jesus upends the lawyer's continuing desire for a minimum by giving him another maximum: everyone you can love is your neighbor. If you can do good to him, he counts as your neighbor.

And that is why what we must do to inherit eternal life is come to Christ, as Christ tells people elsewhere in the Gospels (John 6:27-38). The lawyer's own answers to his questions are right. But giving everything in love for God is a holiness we can find only through Christ's unstinting outpouring of love for us which transforms us into the body of Christ.


4. Ministries


We need more parishioners involved in the Liturgy as Acolytes, Readers and Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist.

I Would Like to Visit Argentina Next Year,' Reveals Pope Francis

In An Interview with 'La Nacion' Newspaper

In an interview given July 8, 2019, to the Argentine newspaper "La Nacion," Pope Francis said, "I would like to visit Argentina next year." He did so discreetly and prudently, expressing again his desire to travel soon to his motherland.

For the time being, this is the only information offered by the Holy Father regarding this possible Apostolic Visit. He established a probable date with the Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, but the precise moment is yet to be defined, reported the newspaper.

The interview's author explained that the Pontiff wishes "to return to the country of his birth, although fleetingly, next year when the spirit of many Argentines has calmed down after the elections to elect (or re-elect) a President,"

According to journalist Joaquin Morales Sola, it's no accident that the Pope chose this moment to announce that he'll go to Argentina in 2020, "most probably in the second semester." Uruguay might well be included, as it's a country he has yet to visit," he added.

Morales also revealed that some Argentine Bishops, with whom the Pontiff spoke recently in their ad Limina visit, advised their compatriot that now is the ideal time to make this trip before any election takes place, so that "no one can then say that he decided to visit his country because one or another candidate won."

The journalist also said that each act of the Holy Father is seen in Argentina as a gesture to Argentine politics. "The Pope needs Argentine leaders to let him be Pope," said a Prelate. Morales clarified that, given the "innumerable conflicts inside and outside the Church," Pope Francis "dedicates very little time (almost none) to his country's politics."

An Archbishop, who sees the Pope often, explained: "in an electoral year in Argentina, the Holy Father doesn't receive any leader of Argentine politics." He said categorically that the Pope "has no political predilection in the forthcoming Argentine elections — none at all. We never hear him pronounce himself on his country's electoral process."

Other topics the journalist of *La Nacion*" addressed with the Pontiff were his recent meeting with the Russian President, Vladimir Putin, the "frictions with the ultra-conservative sectors" of the Church, to which the Holy Father responded: "I don't confront them. They can say what they wish. I don't respond."

Social Justice Statement 2019–2020 Making it Real: Genuine human encounter in our digital world

Social Justice Sunday will be celebrated this year on 29 September. I am writing to inform you about the Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Statement and how you can access it.

The 2019–2020 Statement, titled Making it Real: Genuine human encounter in our digital world, considers the great changes that modern communications technology has brought to our lives. It has revolutionised the way we communicate, work and learn, do business and socialise. Here in Australia over 20 million people are on the internet and 18 million are using social media. For us as Church, there are so many new opportunities to share the Good News of Christ, to bring communities together and to reach out to people in need.

For all these advances, however, there are some serious challenges. The Statement highlights how the dignity of vulnerable people is harmed by online bullying and exploitation. The common good is compromised where certain groups are excluded from the benefits of technology. People's privacy has been undermined when personal data has been appropriated for financial gain. The solidarity of entire communities can be placed at risk by campaigns of misinformation and the spread of 'fake news'.

Pope Francis is calling us to 'boldly become citizens of the digital world' and to ensure it is a place of genuine human encounter. We all have a role in making this new digital world one where hatred and divisions are rejected and our love of God and neighbour is fostered always.

The Statement will be launched in early September. For your convenience, and to improve efficiency, we are now offering online ordering. You can pre-order the Statement now at bit.ly/socialjusticeshop. Alternatively, you can use the attached order form if you would prefer to place your order through the Office for Social Justice. In the attached summary sheet there is a suggested notice that can be used by parishes, schools and groups as Social Justice Sunday approaches.

I commend this Statement to every parish, school and Church network and invite you to promote it as widely as possible.
