Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Go Away

In the Gospel Reading Jesus says that some people will come to him confidently but he will say to them, "I don't know where you are from. Depart from me, all you evildoers!"

This must be one of the most frightening passages in the gospels. But if we get fearful and ask, "Ok, then, what do I have to do in order not to be sent away," we are on the wrong track entirely. If you accept God's gift of his forgiving love, then you are in Christ God does not hate anything that he has made; he loves it." (John 3:16). So you don't have to rush out to bring sandwiches to the poor or do anything else whose purpose is to work your way into God's love and forgiveness. The gift of God's love and forgiveness are already there for you. But then why are those people in the Gospel passage sent away? If the gift is already there, then why don't these people get it?

Well, no gift can be given unilaterally. Successful gift-giving takes two: one to offer the gift, and one to receive it. If you refuse the gift God offers you, the gift cannot be successfully given, can it?

So maybe the whole problem with these people who are sent away is their determination to do the right stuff in order to be part of the in-group. If you want to achieve for yourself what God is offering as a gift, you are in effect refusing the gift, aren't you?

And maybe that's why Jesus says to these people, "I don't know where you are *from*." If you accept God's gift of his forgiving love, then you are *in* Christ; and the spirit of Christ is in you. You don't have to come *from* anywhere to him. You are your beloved's, and he is yours, as the Song of Songs says (Song 6:3).

So what you have to *do* in order not to get sent away is nothing. Just receive the gift, open to the Lord, let the Holy Spirit of Christ in. Then you might bring food to the poor, or write a book, or compose a symphony. But however you share your gifts, you will do so by first having opened to God's love, which is his gift to you.

POPE FRANCIS COLUMN



Pope Francis decried hypocrisy and self-interest Wednesday, saying that Christian community should always be characterized by generosity and solidarity.

"A life set only on profiting and taking advantage of situations at the expense of others inevitably causes interior death," Pope Francis said Aug. 21 in Paul VI Hall.

"And how many people say they are close to the Church, friends of priests, bishops, while they are only looking for their own interest. These are the hypocrisies that destroy the Church," he added in a departure from his prepared remarks.

Pope Francis said he asks the Lord to "pour over us His Spirit of tenderness, which overcomes all hypocrisy and puts into circulation that truth which nourishes Christian solidarity."

The pope said that solidarity is "the inalienable expression of the nature of the Church," which he called the "tender mother of all, especially the poorest."

"Being members of the body of Christ makes believers co-responsible for each other. Being believers in Jesus makes us all co-responsible for each other," he said.

"Among Christians we cannot say: 'Poor person, he has a problem at home, he is going through this family difficulty'. But, I must pray. I carry it with me. I am not be indifferent. This is being a Christian," Francis explained.

Throughout Pope Francis' general audience, a young girl who appeared to have a mental disability, danced across the stage clapping her hands in front of the pope in Paul VI Hall.

"We have all seen this beautiful girl - she is beautiful ... victim of an illness and does not know what she is doing," he said.

Pope Francis asked the audience if they had prayed for this young girl and her family. "Whenever we see someone suffering we must pray," he said.

The pope stressed the importance of concrete acts of generosity in the life of a Christian, particularly with one's time and money.

"The sign that your heart has converted is when conversion reaches your pockets," he said. "There is where we see if one is generous with others, if one helps the weakest, the poorest."

In the life of the Church, there have always been Christians who stripped themselves of unnecessary things to give them to those who needed them, Pope Francis said.

He pointed to the example of the early Christians described in the Acts of the Apostles.

"A concrete example of sharing and communion of goods comes to us from the testimony of Barnabas: he owns a field and sells it to deliver the proceeds to the Apostles," Francis said.

"The Christian community is born from the overabundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit and grows thanks to the leaven of sharing between brothers and sisters in Christ. There is a dynamism of solidarity that builds the Church as the family of God," he said.

Pope Francis also pointed out that there were negative examples of hypocrisy and selfishness among this same community. He described the story of Ananias and his wife Sapphira described in chapter 5 of the Acts of the Apostles.

Ananias and Sapphira sold a piece of property to give the proceeds to the apostles, but retained for themselves a portion of the purchase price.

To which St. Peter responded, "Ananias, why has Satan filled your heart so that you lied to the Holy Spirit and retained part of the price of the land? ... Why did you contrive this deed? You have lied not to human beings, but to God."

Upon hearing these words from Peter, Ananias fell down and died. "This cheating interrupts the chain of free sharing... and the consequences are tragic, are fatal," Pope Francis said.

"We could say that Ananias lied to God because of an isolated conscience," he said. "Hypocrisy is the worst enemy of this Christian community, of this Christian love: that of pretending to love each other, but only looking for one's own interest."

"To fail in the sincerity of sharing ... in the sincerity of love, means to cultivate hypocrisy, move away from the truth, to become selfish, to extinguish the fire of communion and turn to the frost of interior death," the pope said.

Cardinal considers High Court challenge

Cardinal George Pell may launch a High Court challenge to his child sexual abuse convictions after the Victorian Court of Appeal yesterday rejected his bid for freedom. Source: The Australian.

The legal team for the cardinal is examining whether there are grounds for appealing against the decision in the High Court, their last chance to stop Cardinal Pell serving a minimum three years and eight months in jail.

Cardinal Pell, 78, failed yesterday in his bid to overturn his convictions for sexually assaulting two teenage choirboys, when the Victorian Court of Appeal split 2-1, the majority decision keeping the cardinal in jail.

Two senior judges believed the evidence of Cardinal Pell's sole surviving victim, whom a jury found was sexually assaulted in a sacristy at St Patrick's Cathedral in 1996 and again at the cathedral the next year while a choirboy.

Chief judge Anne Ferguson said she and Court of Appeal president Chris Maxwell found there was nothing in the victim's account of Cardinal Pell's offending that meant the jury must have had a doubt as to the cardinal's guilt.

"Throughout his evidence (he) came across as someone who was telling the truth," Chief Justice Ferguson said.

The third appeal judge, Mark Weinberg, disagreed, believing Cardinal Pell should have been acquitted of all charges. Justice Weinberg couldn't exclude the possibility that some of what the man, now in his 30s, had said was concocted.

The Vatican offered qualified support for Cardinal Pell, declaring late yesterday that it would review its position on Australia's most senior Catholic once all avenues of appeal were exhausted.

A spokeswoman for Cardinal Pell said he was "obviously disappointed" with the decision and his legal team would thoroughly examine the judgment to determine whether to make a special leave application to the High Court.

"While noting the 2-1 split decision, Cardinal Pell maintains his innocence. We thank his many supporters," she said.

Meanwhile, Australia's bishops issued statements following the ruling.

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference president Mark Coleridge said the bishops "believe all Australians must be equal under the law and accept [yesterday's] judgment accordingly".

"The bishops realise that this has been and remains a most difficult time for survivors of child sexual abuse and those who support them," Archbishop Coleridge said. "We acknowledge the pain that those abused by clergy have experienced through the long process of the trials and appeal of Cardinal Pell. We also acknowledge that this judgment will be distressing to many people."

Sydney Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP said the judges' split decision was "consistent with the differing views of the juries in the first and second trials, as well as the divided opinion amongst legal commentators and the general public. Reasonable people have taken different views when presented with the same evidence and I urge everyone to maintain calm and civility."

Melbourne Archbishop Peter A. Comensoli offered prayers for Cardinal Pell's accuser. "I humbly acknowledge it has been a challenging time for him, and I stand ready to offer pastoral and spiritual help, should he seek it," he said. "In Christian charity, I will ensure that Cardinal Pell is provided pastoral and spiritual support while he serves the remainder of his sentence, according to the teaching and example of Jesus to visit those in prison."
