Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the Second Sunday of Lent Year A

1. The Promises of God

When God told Abraham to leave home, God was asking a lot of him. The world was not a global village then. Travel wasn't easy; there were no planes, taxis, or hotels. Furthermore, leaving home was a decisive break with all the good of home, because going back for a visit was difficult or just out of the question entirely. So leaving home then was a loss that we can't imagine well anymore, in our era of video calls and texting.

Still, when God told Abraham to leave. Abraham went.

Maybe Abraham is the father of faith because he was willing to stake his life on a promise.

Why did he go? Presumably because he wanted what God offered him. If Abraham left, God told him, then Abraham would become a great nation, and all the communities of the earth would find blessing in him. That is a fairly stunning reward.

So Abraham, who had a great desire for that reward, obeyed God, left what was familiar and beloved to him, and wandered off as a stranger in a strange land.

And then notice what happened.

Abraham lived a very long time after this promise of God's and he stayed faithful to God's commands his whole life. But by the time Abraham died, this is all Abraham had: one son to carry on his posterity under this promise and two grandchildren. By anybody's estimation, this is a very small family. Certainly, one son and two grandsons is not a great nation. Furthermore, hardly any communities knew Abraham at all, let alone found a blessing in him. The idea that all the communities of the earth would find blessing in Abraham really would have been completely laughable at that time, wouldn't it?

Of course, as we now see it, all Jews, Christians, and Muslims are the Abrahamic peoples. Many great nations are included among the Abrahamic peoples. All of them know Abraham and think that they find blessing in Abraham.

And so God's stunning promise to Abraham has been completely fulfilled. But Abraham did not live to see it. He had to take the fulfillment of God's promise to him on faith.

So maybe Abraham is the father of faith because he was willing to stake his life on a promise whose fulfillment did not come in his lifetime on earth. In this, he is not only the patriarch of the family of faith but also a pattern to follow for all those in his family.

4. Coronavirus

I am sorry to inform all parishioners that I have had an email from the Bishop's Conference regarding the following and I have to take the following actions within the weekend and weekday liturgies due to the continuing health concerns of the Coronavirus.

- 1. The offering of the Precious Blood at our Eucharist will cease due to the health concerns. Apparently, at last Sunday's 9am Mass the priest and acolyte had to consume both chalices as parishioners only received the Body of Christ (the Host). The faithful should be reminded that Christ is fully present under either species.
- We have been asked that all parishioners receive Holy Communion in the hand so that the Minister is not in contact with saliva in the mouth. All Ministers of Holy Communion should take particular care to wash their hands before and after distributing. Appropriate means should be made available.
- 3. Parishes and other settings where liturgies are celebrated should make alcohol-based gels or rubs (or like products) available near entrances. Gels will be available as we enter the Church, and Parishioners are invited to use them.
- 4. The offering of the "sign of peace" by the handshake has stopped. NSW Health advises against the shaking of hands because of the virus. At the "sign of peace" can we just turn to the person next to us or behind or in front and greet them with a "wave", "smile" or "a nod".

5. The NSW Health Minister this past week has reminded us of the regular washing of our hands and the use of "Hand Sanitiser". I ask all Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist to use the "Hand Sanitiser" as they come up to the altar. As the old saying goes: Cleanliness is next to Godliness.

5. Easter Ceremonies

As we prepare for the Easter Ceremonies, we need assistance from you, the parishioners.

Sheets for the various liturgies will be available next weekend.

This Weekend I am seeking our youth and young people to assist in the Good Friday afternoon liturgical action by acting out the Lord's Passion. There is a sign-up sheet on the back table of the Church. Please assist by being involved.

6. Stations of the Cross-Friday 9.30-10am



POPE FRANCIS COLUMN



The Holy Land: 'Physical Place Where Jesus Lived Agony, Transforming It Into Redemptive Action Thanks to Infinite Love.'

Cardinal Sandri Explains Collection for Holy Land Helps Safeguard Christians in Middle East, Give Voice to Voiceless, & Preserve Sanctuaries on MARCH 04, 2020.

"The Holy Land is the physical place where Jesus lived this agony and this suffering, transforming it into redemptive action thanks to an infinite love..."

This important reminder was given in a letter regarding this year's Collection for the Holy Land, Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, Prefect of the Vatican's Congregation for Oriental Churches, dated Ash Wednesday, Feb. 26, 2020.

"The Holy Land and especially the Christian community that lives there has always occupied an important place in the heart of the universal Church," he reminds, noting that as St. Paul recalls, when the Church "expresses its solidarity with Jerusalem, including through economic support, [She] performs an act of restitution."

"Indeed," Cardinal Sandri stressed, "the whole Church has received from Jerusalem the gift and joy of the Gospel and of salvation in Christ Jesus "who, though he was rich, made himself poor for you, so that you could become rich through his poverty" (2 Cor 8:9)."

Awareness of this gift, he stressed, "still motivates us to give with joy and generosity, in fidelity to the Church's earnest request to all her children."

Trials Not Finished

"You know well," Cardinal Sandri pointed out, "what severe trials the Church in the Holy Land and throughout the Middle East has endured over the centuries." Saying those trials are not yet finished, he stressed: "the tragedy of the progressive reduction of the number of local faithful continues, with the consequent risk of seeing the various Christian traditions that date back to the early centuries disappear." "Long and exhausting wars continue to produce millions of refugees and strongly influence the future of entire generations.

The Argentinian prelate recognized that "they see themselves deprived of the most basic goods such as the right to a peaceful childhood, to a harmonious school education, to dedicating one's youth to looking for a job and forming a family, to discovering one's vocation, to an industrious and dignified adult life, and to a peaceful old age."

Safeguarding, & a Voice to the Voiceless

"The Church," he reassured, "continues to work to safeguard the Christian presence and to give voice to the voiceless." He said She does so on a pastoral and liturgical level, "fundamental for the life of our small communities," and also through continuing to work seriously to provide quality education through schools. This education, he stressed, is fundamental "for safeguarding Christian identity and for building fraternal coexistence especially with Muslims, according to the indications contained in the "Abu Dhabi Declaration".

Thanks to the generosity of the faithful around the world, the Church continues to make accommodation available to young people who wish to form a new family, as well as to facilitate their search for employment. Likewise, she continues to provide concrete material assistance where there are forms of endemic poverty, such as health needs and humanitarian emergencies linked to the flow of refugees and foreign migrant workers.

Care of the Holy Land's Sanctuaries, he also highlighted, would be impossible without the collection pro Terra Sancta. They are fundamentally important, both because "they preserve the memory of divine revelation, the mystery of the Incarnation and our Redemption," and because "in those places the local Christian community finds the foundations of its identity."

The Cardinal thanked them for anything they can do, and also on Pope Francis' behalf.

- 3. The doctrine of respect for all human life living or deceased
- 4. The belief that Saints have intercessory powers in Heaven
- 5. The truth of our connection to Saints as part of the communion of saints

Recently, I met with our PSSO, Mrs Natasha Steimbeisser. As mentioned late last year after Natasha offered to be the PSSO, I said that the Archbishop has mandated that all parishioners involved in any ministry or group in the parish community is asked to attend a training session.

NEW Child Protection Reporting Obligations

On 1 March 2020 amendments to the *Children and Young Persons* (Care and Protection) Act 1998 will commence to expand mandatory reporter groups. These amendments are part of the NSW Government's response to recommendations made by the Royal Commission. Mandatory reporting is a legislative requirement to make a report to certain government authorities, in NSW, mandatory reporting is primarily regulated by sections 27 and 27A of the *Children and Young Persons* (Care and Protection) Act 1998. Mandatory reporter groups in NSW will be expanded to include:

- ☐ Persons in religious ministry or persons providing religion-based activities to children (e.g. minster of religion, priest, deacon, pastor, rabbi, religious brother or sister)
- ☐ Registered psychologists providing a professional service as a psychologist.

What does this mean for the Archdiocese of Sydney?

This means that any of our clergy, deacons, religious brothers and religious sisters are legally required to make a report when they have reasonable grounds to suspect that a child is at risk of significant harm. It also means that volunteers and paid employees in Agencies and Parishes of the Archdiocese who provide activities to children such as Children's Liturgy, Youth Ministry groups, Sacramental programs are also legally required to make a report when they have reasonable grounds to suspect that a child is at risk of significant harm. A reporter has a duty to report, as soon as practicable, the name or a description of the child and the grounds for suspecting that the child is at risk of significant harm.

What is Risk of Significant Harm?

Risk of significant harm is any one or more of the following circumstances

- a) the child's or young person's basic physical or psychological needs are not being met or are at risk of not being met,
- b) the parents or other caregivers have not arranged and are unable or unwilling to arrange for the child or young person to receive necessary medical care
- c) the child or young person has been, or is at risk of being, physically or sexually abused or ill-treated
- d) the child or young person is living in a household where there have been incidents of domestic violence and, as a consequence, the child or young person is at risk of serious physical or psychological harm.
- e) a parent or other caregiver has behaved in such a way towards the child or young person that the child or young person has suffered or is at risk of suffering serious psychological harm.

How to make a report?

Before making a report to the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ), please contact the Safeguarding Office on 9390 5810. The Safeguarding Office will help you determine whether the report needs to be made directly to the DCJ or another government authority. Reports to the DCJ are made by calling the NSW Child Protection Helpline on 132 111.
