Dear Parishioners, We celebrate the Fith Sunday of Easter

1. Big Small and Being Great in the Service of the Lord

The problem reported in the First Reading has to do with food for widows. The Greeks thought that their widows were being neglected and that the widows among the Jews were getting the best of things, and so the Greeks complained to the Apostles. The Apostles said, sensibly enough, that they couldn't be expected to handle food distribution. Their job was to evangelize and spread the Gospel. And so they picked some people to do the small job of supervising food handouts for them. Stephen was one of those picked.

In his witness and his martyrdom, he was not small.

Who would have wanted to be in that group with Stephen? The people in Stephen's group were chosen to do a job that was not nearly as important as the work the Apostles were doing. That's why the Apostles wanted somebody else to do it. By comparison with important things, like spreading the gospel, or anything else great and admirable, watching over food distribution is a very small job.

But Stephen didn't complain that the job was beneath his talents and abilities. He didn't insist on being given a role in the great work of the Apostles. He just took the small job he had been offered, and he served the Lord whole-heartedly in it.

Later in the book of Acts (Acts 7) we learn what came of Stephen's humility. His whole-hearted service of the Lord in food distribution attracted the attention, and the hatred, of those outside the growing Church; and they went after him. In the worst of circumstances, with his life at stake, he gave a powerful witness to the Lord he loved, and the surrounding crowd stoned him to death.

In his witness and his martyrdom, he was not small. He was glorious. His life and work for the Lord became part of Scripture itself, and for over two thousand years all Christians have honoured and admired him. And so his whole-hearted service of the Lord in the little job of food distribution, the job that was not worthy of being compared with the job of the Apostles, made Stephen a participant in the great work the Apostles did. In the witness of his death, he became a partner in the gospel-spreading of the Apostles and more than worthy of being in their company.

2. Mother's Day

This weekend, we celebrate Mother's Day differently to other years due to "social distancing" and the number of family members who can gather at one time.

As you gather to celebrate Mother's Day, I invite families and mothers and grandmothers to pray the two blessing prayers in this weeks bulletin (they are the same as previous years) before you share the Mother's Day meal together.

3. Thank You

I thank those parishioners who have been able to support the parish while the Church is closed and sacraments unable to be celebrated with a one-off contribution or those parishioners who have been regularly giving through "direct debit," to the parish. Your support to the parish and to myself has been able to pay the bills that keep coming even during this lockdown period of time.

Hopefully, it will not be too long before the Eucharist can be celebrated again.

Pope's Morning Homily: To Be Free & Close to Christ, Don't Be Lukewarm in Faith Nor Worldly

MAY 05, POPE'S MORNING HOMILY

We cannot be lukewarm in our faith, and we must eliminate those attitudes and the worldliness, that gets in the way of a free and close relationship with Christ.

Today, May 5th, Pope Francis gave this encouragement to those watching his private daily Mass at his residence Casa Santa Marta, reported Vatican News.

At the start of the Mass, Pope Francis prayed for all victims of Coronavirus.

"Today we pray for the deceased who have died because of the pandemic," the Holy Father said, acknowledging: "They have died alone, without the caresses of their loved ones. So many did not even have a funeral."

"May the Lord welcome them in His glory," he said.

In his homily, the Holy Father reflected on today's Gospel reading according to St. John (Jn 10:22-30), in which several Jews ask Jesus to say openly whether He is the Christ. Jesus responds that He has already told them so, yet they do not believe.

This episode, the Holy Father said, is an invitation to reflect on our own faith. "Do I believe? What makes me stop outside the door that is Jesus?"

The Pope encouraged faithful to take account of stumbling blocks to their faith or take stock of the worldliness which can bog us down.

When our hearts are rigid, this impedes our faith, the Pope reminded.

"Jesus," he said, "reproached the doctors of the law for their rigidity in interpreting the law, which is not faithfulness. Faithfulness is always a gift of God; rigidity is only security for oneself."

A good woman, Francis said, came up to him once to ask his advice after she went to a wedding one Saturday afternoon, and thought that Mass would fulfill her Sunday obligation.

But later—he recalled—she realized that the Mass readings did not correspond to those for Sunday, and felt that she was in mortal sin because she had not attended "a real Sunday Mass".

That kind of rigidity, the Holy Father stated, drives us away from the "wisdom and beauty of the Lord, and robs us of our freedom."

Francis also lamented those who are "imprisoned by wealth."

"There are many of us who have entered the door of the Lord but then fail to continue because we are imprisoned by wealth. Jesus takes a hard line regarding wealth... Wealth keeps us from going ahead. Do we need to fall into poverty? No, but, we must not become slaves to wealth. Wealth is the lord of this world, and we cannot serve two masters."

The Pope named three other attitudes that create distance between us and Jesus: apathy, clericalism, and the worldly spirit.

Apathy, the Pope said, is a type of "tiredness that takes away our desire to strive forward and leaves us lukewarm." Clericalism, the Pontiff noted, seeks to put us in Jesus' place. Instead of letting the Master lead, clericalism imposes restrictions that must be met before one enters the door of faith.

"It is a terrible sickness," he said, "that robs the faithful of freedom and impedes them from going to Jesus." Often being worldly stops us at the door of faith.

"We can think," he said, "of how some Sacraments are celebrated in some parishes. At times it is impossible to discern the grace and presence of Jesus."

These, the Pope warned, are some of the things that stop us from becoming members of Jesus's flock.

"We are 'sheep' of all these things – wealth, apathy, rigidity, worldliness, clericalism, ideologies," he said, "But freedom is lacking and we cannot follow Jesus without freedom."

"At times freedom might go too far, and we might slip and fall. Yes, that's true. But this is slipping before becoming free."

Consider, the Holy Father advised, whether we are free from these temptations in order to progress in the knowledge of the Lord.

Pope Francis concluded, saying: "May the Lord enlighten us to see within ourselves if we have the freedom required to go through the door which is Jesus, to go beyond it with Jesus in order to become sheep of His flock." The Pope ended the celebration with Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction, inviting the faithful to make a Spiritual Communion.

It's been coming together more as a Christian and Christian family; it's about bringing Christ into our lives mor and into our families more. Some parishioners have emailled saying they feel closer to others even despite the separation. You see physical separation can express <u>love</u> in new ways. The challenged is not to miss this opportunity now, but also to remember these new ways once we gather again to celebrate Eucharist as the St Anthony of Padua faith family.

As a faith community may we come through this "trial" more resourceful and resolved to live more for God, our families and each other.

Viewing numbers across the archdiocese with those streaming Masses are continuing to increase which is great. More than one million people across the country watched the Good Friday and Easter Sunday services live from St Mary's Cathedral last weekend on Channel 7.

The Passion of Our Lord on Good Friday reached 545,000 broadcast viewers with an additional 86,000 live-streaming and social media viewers reaching a total audience of 631,000, 42.4 per cent of the available audience. The Easter Sunday 10.30am Mass reached a whopping 568,000 broadcast viewers with a further 113,000 live-streaming and social media viewers reaching a total of 681,000 viewers – attracting a 46.3 per cent audience share.

Overwhelmingly, the audiences were highest in the Sydney metropolitan area, followed by NSW, the ACT, Western Australia and Queensland.
