Dear Parishioners. We celebrate the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

1. Death

The Gospel reading this week is focused on death. In it, Jesus tells his disciples not to be afraid of those who can kill them. Those people are not to be feared, because death itself is not to be feared.

No doubt, there is always something sorrowful about dying, because death separates the dying person from his family and his friends; and they still have to slog through their lives in this world without their companion. But Jesus is not telling people to accept death without sorrow. He is telling them not to fear death.

How can Jesus tell us not to be afraid of death?

If you were walking alone down a dark street late at night, and you saw a small knot of strangers gathered menacingly at a corner, wouldn't you be afraid? Shouldn't you be afraid? If the cancer doctor tells you that you have only months to live, wouldn't you—shouldn't you—be afraid?

How can Jesus tell us-actually, command us-not to be afraid of death? Well, think about it this way. If you are surprised when you discover that you are dying, you just haven't been paying attention. None of us is getting out of this alive. Everyone of us will die. It is just a question of when. Or maybe better: it is just a question of how.

Here is how it will be if you love the Lord. In dying, you will move through the veil that separates you, in this world of sorrow and suffering, from the Lord's own presence. There, on the other side, you will find all tears wiped away—the tears you have already wept and the ones that are stuck in your heart right now. All those tears will be wiped away by your Creator with a tenderness so great that you will think you must be dreaming. The beauty and the goodness of that new world will surpass your every desire. And you yourself will be something lovelier than you ever imagined you could be. Surrounded by beauty and goodness, bathed in the love of the Lord, transformed, yourself, in the beauty of holiness, you will join the angels in singing for joy at what the Lord has done.

Are you afraid now? Is this scary to you?

What is worth fearing is losing all of this beauty and goodness on the other side of death because you will not now surrender to the love of the Lord who calls you to himself. But this is a kind of death that comes only from sin, as the Second Reading says. No one else can force it on you, only you can cause this death in yourself.

And that is why the Lord tells his disciples not to fear those who can kill the body.

2. Roadworks in Eleventh Avenue

A reminder that Eleventh Avenue is still a road construction site and rain will not assist in getting the job finished.

The Liverpool Council tells us:

Before ashpalt is placed on the road an emulsion is sprayed on the surface. If you drive on the emulsion it will stick to your tyres. It is advised that you do NOT drive onto any concrete driveways (this includes th Church driveway) as it will mark the driveway.

After the road is open you may drive on the new surface but it should be in low speeds and with care.

When the road is open you are asked to drive slowly in Eleventh Avenue to protect car duco on your car, as well as others ie your neighbour.

3. Parish Giving Envelopes

Parishioners who have envelopes are asked to collect them from the back table for the new Financial Year.

4. End of financial Year 19/20

As the FY 19/20 comes to a close, I invite parishioners who desire a Tax Deduction to either attend Mass or drop the envelope into the presbytery at 320 Edmondson Avenue.

The tax deduction on your giving is 70%. I know due to the lockdown, life has been different for us all, but any parishioner who seeks a tax deduction is welcome to make a one-off donation. Please make it payable to St Anthony Church Account. As we move into a new FY 20/21, I invite parishioners to support the Envelope System, as through the envelopes we have some means of budgeting for the year ahead.

If you have not filled in a "Census Form" I ask you to take a form off the back table fill it in and place it in the "Census Box."

As we come to the end of another Financial Year, I thank all parishioners for your ongoing support to our parish and our parish community.

5. Catechist's Meeting

We have been notified that SRE can begin again in Term 3 at Austral Public School. To prepare for our return to the classroom there will be a Catechist Meeting to be held during the first week of the school holidays.

Date: Tuesday July 7 after the 9am Mass.

Place: Parish Hall

Catechists are invited to attend Mass first and then, move over to the parish hall for the meeting.

6, Weekend Masses


The National Council is increasing the numbers who can attend Church (and other Venues) from 50 to using the 4 square metre rule. The Church is 280 sq mtrs so, it means from the first weekend in July, we can have 70 people at each Mass. Due to small numbers attending the 8.15am Mass and the closeness between Masses, the 8.15am Mass will be concluded from next weekend. So, for the weekend of 4/5 July, the Masses will be: Saturday Vigils: 4.30pm and 5.30pm Sunday Morning: 7.30am & 9am Bookings will need to be ongoing till government indicates that we don't need to take names anymore

Taking of names etc is as government mentions for "tracing" purposes.

7. Sacrament of Baptism

I am happy to celebrate this Sacrament, but families need to make an appointment in order to fill in the "Information sheet" and discuss the desire to have their child baptised into the Christian Community. Due to "social distancing" only one family baptism is celebrated after the 9am Sunday Mass. After July 1, the State Government is moving from numbers to sq metres. As the Church is 280 sq metres, we can only accommodate 70 people. Families need to be aware of this matter when making up the invitation list.

POPE FRANCIS COLUMN



Pope: This Feast of Sacred Heart, Discover Riches Hidden in Jesus' Heart

Holy Father's Appeal Ahead of Solemnity 'So Dear' to Christians: JUNE 17, 2020 General Audience.

I invite you to discover the riches hidden in the Heart of Jesus....

Two days ahead of the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, June 19, Pope Francis gave this invitation toward the conclusion of his weekly General Audience. Recalling this Solemnity is "so dear to Christian people," Francis said: "I invite you to discover the riches hidden in the Heart of Jesus, to learn to love your neighbour."

Addressing the elderly, young people, sick and newlyweds, the Holy Father suggested: "Turn your gaze to the Heart of Jesus and you will find peace, comfort and hope." Pope Francis also told French-speaking faithful watching to "not be afraid to present to Him all the intentions of our suffering humanity," including "its fears" and "miseries." "May this Heart, full of love for men, give each one hope and confidence!" he said.

Below is the Vatican-provided English summary of the Holy Father's catechesis at today's General Audience:

Pope Francis: Dear Brothers and Sisters: In our continuing catechesis on prayer, we now consider the prayer of Moses. The book of Exodus portrays Moses – from a human point of view – as a failure.

Yet at a certain point in his life, he encounters God in the wilderness. From a burning bush, the Lord calls Moses to return to Egypt in order to lead his people to freedom. But Moses, faced with the majesty of Almighty God and his demands, resists the call, protesting his unsuitability for such a great task.

Nevertheless, God entrusts him with the responsibility of conveying the divine law to the people of Israel, and Moses becomes their great intercessor, especially when they are tempted or have sinned. With hands outstretched to God, Moses makes of himself a kind of bridge between earth and heaven, pleading for the people when they are most in need. In this way he prefigures Jesus, our great intercessor and high priest.


We Christians are also called to share in this type of prayer, interceding for those who need God's help, and for the redemption of the whole world.

A bin has been placed in the Ladies toilets for soiled nappies and sanitary napkins.



SAINT OF THE WEEK JOHN FISHER MONDAY 22 JUNE

John Fisher was born in Beverley, Yorkshire, in 1469, the eldest son of Robert Fisher, a modestly prosperous merchant of Beverley, and Agnes, his wife. He was one of four children. His father died when John was eight. His mother remarried and had five more children by her second husband, William White. Fisher seems to have had close contacts with his extended family all his life. Fisher's early education was probably received in the school attached to the collegiate church in his home town.

Fisher studied at the University of Cambridge from 1484, where at Michaelhouse he came under the influence of William Melton, a pastorally-minded theologian open to the new current of reform in studies arising from the Renaissance. Fisher earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1487 and in 1491 proceeded to a Master of Arts degree. Also in 1491 Fisher received a papal dispensation to enter the priesthood despite being under canonical age. [3] Fisher was ordained into the Catholic priesthood on 17 December 1491 – the same year that he was elected a fellow of his college.[4] He was also made Vicar of Northallerton, Yorkshire. In 1494 he resigned his benefice to become proctor of the university and three



years later was appointed master debater, about which date he also became chaplain and confessor to Margaret Beaufort, Countess of Richmond and Derby, mother of King Henry VII. On 5 July 1501, he became a doctor of sacred theology and 10 days later was elected Vice-Chancellor of the University. Under Fisher's guidance, his patroness Lady Margaret founded St John's and Christ's Colleges at Cambridge, and a Lady Margaret Professorship of Divinity at each of the two universities at Oxford and Cambridge, Fisher himself becoming the first occupant of the Cambridge chair. From 1505 to 1508 he was also the President of Queens' College. At the end of July 1516 he was at Cambridge for the opening of St John's College and consecrated the chapel.

Fisher's strategy was to assemble funds and attract to Cambridge leading scholars from Europe, promoting the study not only of Classical Latin and Greek authors, but of Hebrew. He placed great weight upon pastoral commitment, above all popular preaching by the endowed staff. Fisher's foundations were also dedicated to prayer for the dead, especially through chantry foundations. Fisher had a vision to which he dedicated all his personal resources and energies. A scholar and a priest, humble and conscientious, he managed despite occasional opposition to administer a whole university, one of only two in England. He conceived and saw through long-term projects.

A stern and austere man, Fisher was known to place a human skull on the altar during Mass and on the table during meals.

Erasmus said of John Fisher: "He is the one man at this time who is incomparable for uprightness of life, for learning and for greatness of soul."

By papal bull dated 14 October 1504, Fisher was appointed the bishop of Rochester at the personal insistence of Henry VII. Rochester was then the poorest diocese in England and usually seen as a first step on an ecclesiastical career. Nonetheless, Fisher stayed there, presumably by his own choice, for the remaining 31 years of his life. At the same time, like any English bishop of his day, Fisher had certain state duties. In particular, he maintained a passionate interest in the University of Cambridge. In 1504 he was elected the university's chancellor. Re-elected annually for 10 years, Fisher ultimately received a lifetime appointment. At this date he is also said to have acted as tutor to the future king, Henry VIII. As a preacher his reputation was so great that Fisher was appointed to preach the funeral oration for King Henry VII and the Lady Margaret, both of whom died in 1509, the texts being extant. Besides his share in the Lady Margaret's foundations, Fisher gave further proof of his zeal for learning by inducing Erasmus to visit Cambridge. The latter attributes it ("Epistulae" 6:2) to Fisher's protection that the study of Greek was allowed to proceed at Cambridge without the active molestation that it encountered at Oxford.

Despite his fame and eloquence, it was not long before Fisher came into conflict with the new King, his former pupil. The dispute arose over funds left by the Lady Margaret, the King's grandmother, for financing foundations at Cambridge. In 1512 Fisher was nominated as one of the English representatives at the Fifth Council of the Lateran, then sitting, but his journey to Rome was postponed, and finally abandoned.

Fisher has also been named, though without any real proof, as the true author of the royal treatise against Martin Luther entitled "Assertio septem sacramentorum" (Defence of the Seven Sacraments), published in 1521, which won for King Henry VIII the title "Fidei Defensor" (Defender of the Faith). Prior to this date Fisher had denounced various abuses in the church, urging the need for disciplinary reforms. On about 11 February 1526, at the King's command, he preached a famous sermon against Luther at St Paul's Cross, the open-air pulpit outside St Paul's Cathedral in London. This was in the wake of numerous other controversial writings; the battle against heterodox teachings increasingly occupied Fisher's later years. In 1529 Fisher ordered the arrest of Thomas Hitton, a follower of William Tyndale, and subsequently

interrogated him. Hitton was tortured and executed at the stake for heresy.
